Our plan for Welborne is currently being looked at by the Independent Inspector. If he agrees that the plan is sound it will be another step forward in the delivery of thousands of much needed new homes, jobs and associated infrastructure, while preserving the strategic countryside gaps between our town and our villages. We should have an update on this in our next issue.

Finally, I would like to wish everyone a very happy Christmas and peaceful New Year. Do please continue to contact me if you have any ideas or suggestions for how we can improve the Borough. I look forward to hearing from you.

In September, Fareham College's new **Centre for Excellence in Engineering Manufacturing and Advanced Skills Training** (CEMAST) – opened its doors at Daedalus. Not satisfied with completing just one new building, work on a second ambitious project started in June. The new £16 million **Bishopsfield Road Campus** will offer workshops for a wide range of Construction trades, a Digital Industries Lab, a Media, Music and Performing Arts Suite, plus an on-site Gym and Sports Centre. It's being built by the same architect and contractor that completed CEMAST.







Peter Marsh, Deputy Principal at Fareham College said: "We are investing £28m between 2013 and 2015 in new technology and facilities to help provide learners from Fareham, Gosport and surrounding areas with the very best educational experience. Put simply, our aim is to build an outstanding College."

As part of the project, improvements will be made to make the College more environmentally friendly, including swapping oiled fir d heating for new gas boilers. When the work is done the local community will have access to a new gym, theatre and multi-use games area. Over 100 new trees will be planted to enhance the parkland setting of the College.

When work on the new campus is finish d in 2015, 120 new homes will be built on the site. Following this, in 2017 a new 3 hectare public park will be opened there, which will be owned and managed by Fareham Borough Council.

Daedalus developments flying ahead

There are lots of exciting developments happening in the Solent Enterprise Zone at Daedalus. In addition to CEMAST, Fareham Borough Council is building a £5.3m Innovation Centre, with offic space and workshops for small businesses and start-ups in the engineering, aerospace, aviation and marine and other industries.

Work on the Centre started in May and the building is quickly taking shape. When it opens in the new year the Innovation Centre will be a supportive home for a community of new and growing businesses. The project will create around 150 jobs.

The Council has appointed Oxford Innovation to promote and manage the Centre. With over 20 years' experience in running similar centres, they will provide expert advice and support to the entrepreneurs, start-ups and small businesses that will be based there.

Improvements to the 1,100m runway at Daedalus, including resurfacing, are also being undertaken by Hampshire County Council. When finish d, these will support an application for a commercial licence for the airfield. The licence would allow a greater variety of small planes to use the airfield and encourage more businesses to join the already thriving aviation community at the site.

The wide ranging developments at the Enterprise Zone will help attract new jobs to the area and support the future prosperity of Fareham.

Fareham has excelled once again with its 11th consecutive win and gold award from South and Southeast England in Bloom. A presentation for the regional awards were held at the Amex Stadium in Brighton on 17 September where Fareham was recognised as having some of the most thriving parks and community participation projects in the county.

Holly Hill Woodland Park, Warsash Common, The Sensory Garden, Civic Gardens, Westbury Manor Garden, and Portchester Crematorium Grounds all came out with Gold awards.

Fareham also received the most coveted Hampshire Life award for the highest marked entry in Hampshire.

VILLAGE GREENGROCER

Along the old streets of Titchfield Square is the traditional **Village Greengrocer**. We went and spoke to Richard and Ruth Collins about their shop, getting up at 2.30am and how the local community play an important part in their business.











How long have you been up and running in Titchfield and why did you pick this area?

Ruth: We started up here in March but Richard has always had his own fruit and veg market stall that he goes to four times a week in Dorset and Littlehampton, while I stay and look after the shop.

Titchfield is a lovely little village with a great community and I've lived here all my life. We know everyone here and it's great that they can come into the shop and get their fresh fruit and veg, while having a chat with us.

Why do you think it's important to have local shops in the area?

Richard: We get a lot of the older generation coming to us which is great as they can walk to the Square and get their shopping all in one place. A lot of people don't drive and don't want to get a bus to supermarkets, so they come here for their fresh fruit and veg.

We also get a lot of people come in from the school run. Mums and dads come in after they've dropped the kids off, and the children come in after school. They used to walk on the other side of the street to get sweets from the shop, but now they see all the lovely fruit here and want that instead!

What sort of produce do you sell?

Richard: We try to sell as much local produce as possible. We get the strawberries from Titchfield and we buy as much British produce as we can. A lot of our veg is ordered in the afternoon and then picked the next morning ready to be sold in our shop, so it's all lovely and fresh. I also get up at 2:30am every morning to go to the fruit market!

A lot of the local businesses around here use us for their trade such as the pub, butchers and jewellers and we use them in return, so it's great that the community all help each other out.

What makes you stand out from other greengrocers?

Ruth: We wanted to be traditional and rustic and we like to sell something a bit different. We did lots of research on how old greengrocers used to look and have tried to reflect that in our shop. Our friend built the wooden structure so it gives more of an authentic feel.

We also held a taster session outside the shop offering locally made jam with toast and biscuits, which was really popular. Soon we will also be selling homemade pickled onions and wild bird food.

Do you have any plans for the future?

Richard: Potentially, but we're not going to reveal anything just yet so watch this space!





Check out your local Children's Centre!



Have you discovered what's on offer at your local Children's Centre? Children's Centres are commissioned by the County Council and managed by **4Children** – they specialise in offering a range of family focused activities and services. These often include family health services, parenting courses, toddler / baby groups and employment support.

For some new mums and dads, adjusting to family life can be daunting. At children's centres they can support families to access groups, courses and extra guidance in parenting.

Young, local mum, Sarah was invited by her health visitor and outreach worker to attend a 5 week baby massage course. She tells us not only did it help her to bond with her new baby, it was also a big boost to her confidence and became part of her life:

"When I was asked to attend the course, I was hesitant to agree at first. I was worried about meeting the other mums and suffering from high anxiety levels. The firs week of the course I didn't speak much, but over the next few weeks I started to make friends there. This made me feel more comfortable and my confidence grew. I started to look forward to going to group and even helped first time mums with advice and support.

Once the baby massage group finish d I started to attend the weekly bumps and babes group. It was lovely to meet up with some of the mums from baby massage there. I was then asked to attend the confidence building group. Again I started to feel nervous but nowhere near as bad as before. I found my confidence grew and grew and I absolutely loved the course, making more new friends.

I now go into the Centre regularly and use the facilities with my children. I have recently joined the partnership board where I speak up as a parent voice in the meetings. My next step is to become a volunteer. Attending the Centre has definitely boosted my confidence both personally and as a mum."

Warsash Clock Tower has overlooked the village for over a hundred years. The estate which it was part of has long been demolished, yet the tower, though it has changed, has remained a constant landmark. Now a private office, we were given a tour inside by owner, Simon Woodham.

WARSASH CLOCK TOWER Standing the test of time



Beginning

The Clock Tower can be found on the busy crossroads on Shore Road, its four storey high red brick standing out above the traffic. The buildings next to it are now office or shop units but once they and the Clock Tower formed part of the Warsash House Estate, including a stable, garage and accommodation for the chauffeur.

The Tower was built in around 1900 by G.A Shenley, the son of a British Army captain (his mother met his father when she was just 15 and he was on duty in New York; their subsequent affair and elopement caused quite a scandal at the time). The Clock Tower is the largest of three towers on the site, each of which originally contained water storage tanks, providing water for the Estate.

The clock itself was made by Gillett and Johnson, Croydon, who also made, among others, the clocks at Portsmouth Naval Base and Salisbury Cathedral. Originally there were two clock faces on the Tower, one facing out to sea, one facing back to the village. Today only the one facing into the village remains. The clock struck ship's time on a large bell, making it an important navigational landmark for sailors. The heavy brass mechanism had to be hand wound from the ground floor once a week to keep it working.

Times a'changing

By the 30s, the clock was rusty and had stopped working. Happily, it was repaired

in 1937 in time for the Coronation of King George VI. The following year, the Tower and some of the adjoining properties were bought for £2,000 by Mr. Victor Collins, who wanted to expand his car dealership (there is still a garage there today). He made a number of changes to the building, to allow he and his family to live there. The large water tanks were removed, the archway on the ground floor was bricked up, to allow for a lounge and kitchen and three flights of stairs were installed to replace the old ladders between floors. The large cast iron bell which was part of the original clock mechanism was removed and replaced with a small electric clock on the back of the clock face. Outside the brick boundary wall was removed.

Modern times

As we entered the tower via the courtyard, I was interested to find out how it retained its links to the past. The ground floor is now the reception, with a cottage style staff kitchen and offices on the other floors. Winding stairs take you to the top, an octagonal shaped room, with windows all around. This is now an office/ oard room. The inside of the clock face dominates one wall, with its mechanism quietly ticking away in the background. The 360 degree views have lost none of their wow factor over the years. "We get great views of passing cruise ships", Simon tells me, "you can also see Fawley, Netley Abbey, the Spinnaker Tower and on a





clear day, the Isle of Wight."

In the décor there is much reference to the tower's nautical connection with model boats, artwork depicting ships at sea and driftwood sculptures, and when you look out to the horizon you can image yourself at sea. I ask Simon what it's like to have his office up there (I would spend a lot of time gazing out of the window). "It's been great for business, because everyone wants to come here; it's such a nice space." In addition to the distracting views, there are other challenges of working in such an unusual space. The large Italian marble table in the boardroom had to be brought in by crane and the windows removed.

Since buying the Clock Tower in 2010, Simon has done much to restore it. The roof, windows and floor have all been re-done. There are further plans to improve the weather vane on the roof and reinstate the flagpole. They propose to run a competition of all the local schools to design a flag to be flown prominently above the Tower. It's great to hear that the Clock Tower is being so well looked after. The building projects a little piece of Victorian England at passersby, yet also maintains its relevance to modern life. Indeed Simon tells me, whenever someone needs directions in the village, the guiding point is always the Clock Tower.

Meet the Mayor

What have you enjoyed most about being Mayor?

I'm privileged to meet so many inspiring people, whether at fundraising events, Civic dos or official openings.

This year's Fareham Citizens of Honour have all made significant contributions to our community or shown real strength in adversity, and I was pleased to host them for tea in the Mayor's Parlour. I've also enjoyed meeting people who work for my Mayoral charities, some of them volunteers who give up their free time because they're passionate about helping others.

Can you tell us more about your Mayoral charities for the year?

This year my Mayoral charities are the Stubbington Ark animal shelter and the Rowans Hospice. The Ark provides shelter for cats, dogs, exotic species and farm stock. They look after the animals very well, many of whom thankfully go on to find new homes. My wife and I have had many cats – we just wish we could take them all in!

The Rowans Hospice is a local charity dedicated to improving the lives of people with cancer and other life-shortening illnesses. It's a big year for the Hospice as this year is their 20th Anniversary. I'm delighted to be able to help them promote their services and events in their anniversary year.

You've attended a variety of events as Mayor, can you tell us about some of the highlights?

I'm invited to so many events, it's a shame

there isn't time for me to attend them all. In June, I donned a hard hat and reflective jacket for the official 'concrete laying' ceremony at the new Innovation Centre at Daedalus. When this is complete it will be a fantastic space for new businesses. In July, I helped launch Access All Areas, our two week programme of events for young people. It was great to see so many teenagers enjoying the free activates on offer in the Borough.

4 August was the Centenary of the outbreak of World War One. It was an honour to unveil our new memorial in West Street, Fareham, remembering those who gave their lives. I also found myself being signed up at the 'enlisting office' at Westbury Manor! In September, I officiall opened the newly refurbished Fareham Leisure Centre, so I'm kept pretty busy.

What would you say the challenges of the role are?

There's a lot of protocol to remember. For instance whether I wear the full robes or just the chains depends on the nature of the event. Luckily I have a Mayor's attendant and my wife Pamela to help me.

It's also a challenge balancing the busy Mayoral calendar with home life, including my four grandchildren and four stepgrandchildren! I still have to carry out ward work as well, help with resident's problems and attend committee meetings. I certainly won't complain though, as you're only privileged to be Mayor for a year and I'm enjoying every minute!

A WINTER WANDER Titchfield Canal to Hill Head



This walk features Titchfield Canal, the second oldest artificial waterway in Britain. Once used to allow boats to reach the heart of the village to trade in the 17th century, the canal is now home to an array of wildlife that you may be able to spot while walking alongside it, all the way down to the coast of Hill Head and through the farmland of Titchfield

Canal Path

The walk, popular with dog walkers, begins at Bridge Street car park. Turn left out of the green gates and go through the kissing gate onto the pathway. You will see the canal on your right and Titchfield Haven on your left. This part of the walk can get very muddy in the winter so make sure you have your wellies on! Continue along the path, past a couple of old farmers' bridges, until you come to a wooden gate with a bridge on your right. Look out for the large alder tree on the corner, which is about 60 years old. Go through the gates and follow the path around to the left.

Along this pathway you will find a combination of wildlife and farm stock. You may be lucky enough to catch a glimpse of a Kingfisher early in the morning; however you are more likely to spot a water vole scurrying around underneath the reeds. Since 2013, just over 1000 water voles have been released along the southern end of the Meon Valley.

At the end of the path you will come to a large wooden gate. Go through the narrow gap and turn left, following the pathway. You have now reached the half-way point! If you follow the pathway around to the left you can stop off for a drink and a bite to eat at the Haven Café, or if you walk along Cliff Road you will come to Breezes Café and The Osborne View.


Hill Head Coast

Carry on with the walk by crossing the road and passing through the chalets at Meon Shore. Go all the way to the end and turn left which will take you onto the beach. On a clear, bright day you can see the Isle of Wight in the distance, but you may have to wait until winter is over for a good view! Go up the cliff path and follow it around. There are various view points along here offering great scenery of the coast, but be very careful near the cliff edge.

Farmland

Carry along the path and go over the first stile on your right into the field and follow straight on. On either side you will see agricultural land where farmers grow vegetable crops. Remember to look behind you to take in the beautiful views of farmland and the coast. You will then come to another stile which you need to cross over and follow the pathway through the woodland. This will take you to Thatcher's Copse car park. Go straight through carrying on into the copse until you come to a farm track. Turn left and walk all the way to the end until you reach a signpost. Turn right following the sign to Little Brownwich Farm. Be aware that this road is used by farmers so there may be tractors using it. In the winter months there will be some very large puddles along here that you will also need to dodge!

On your right you will see another stile. Cross this and follow the public footpath signs through the field. At some points you can see Portsdown Hill and the Spinnaker Tower in the distance. Eventually you will reach a gate leading onto Posbrook Lane. Along the road look out for the interesting privet hedge that has been shaped to look like a train. Cross the road and turn right and take the first left down a concrete track, opposite a row of cottages. Follow this all the way to the end, until you reach the bridge with the alder tree on the corner, which you came to earlier on in the walk. Turn left through the gates and follow the pathway which will lead you back to Bridge Street car park.









Walk duration 2 hours 30minutes (approx.)

Important information

- Walk is 5 miles (approx.)
- There is only one bench at the half way point near Meon Shore
- Refreshments/toilets at Titchfield Haven Café and Breezes Café
- Parking at Bridge Street car park
- Not accessible to wheelchairs or pushchairs

FAREHAM COMMUNITY HOSPITAL

The hospital in Sarisbury was formally opened by Princess Anne in 2010 and offers a wide range of services to its patients. Many of you may not have even realised that Fareham had a hospital, but for others it is an important facility that saves them a longer trip to Portsmouth or Southampton, or sometimes further.

What services does the hospital provide?

- Occupational Therapy supporting adults with various health problems or conditions, including people with short-term illness or injury and those managing a long-term condition
- Older People's Mental Health
- Physiotherapy including back and neck pain and people who have problems with their muscles or joints.
- There are a range of other services provided

at Fareham Community Hospital by Portsmouth Hospitals NHS Trust, Solent NHS Trust and NHS Southern Health Foundation Trust. All services at the hospital are offered on a referral basis by appointment only, which are booked in advance.

The Friends of Fareham Community Hospital

The hospital has fantastic support from a group of volunteers called 'The Friends of Fareham Community Hospital'. Members of the group offer support including welcoming patients to the hospital, helping to man reception desks, providing information to patients, decorating waiting areas with flowers, magazines and books and helping to link the hospital with the local community. The volunteers are at the hospital almost every day to ensure that patients' visits are as easy and stress-free as possible.

Dementia Centre

Efforts are underway to potentially make Fareham Community Hospital a 'dementia centre'. The NHS Fareham and Gosport Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) is working with a number of groups so that they can introduce a variety of dementia-related services to patients and make them more easily accessible to people.

Other services will continue to be provided to patients who are referred to the hospital, but by introducing dementiarelated services it will mean that the hospital is being used to its full potential, as well as helping to improve the lives of those living with dementia.

The CCG will continue to work closely with local GPs, meaning we could see a 'dementia centre' at Fareham Community Hospital in the near future.

A new way of working for you...

One of the first teams to change their approach to customers is the Housing Repairs Service where we have seen significant, positive results. This team is responsible for maintaining 2,371 Council owned properties, dealing with issues such as leaking taps, replacement locks, foggy windows and leaking roofs. When the project began in November 2013, many of the team's systems were more than 20 years old and on average it took around 90 days to complete a repair job.

Now with a new way of working which focusses on what matters to our customers, the average length of time it takes for the Housing Repairs Service to complete a repair job is just 3½ days. The team have had many success stories of customers happy with their new approach. One such example is that of 97 year old Douglas Cox, from Warsash. There had been a few problems with Mr Cox leaving his key inside the front door, which meant carers couldn't get in to see him. Shortly after receiving a call from his family we were able to organise a new lock, an outdoor key safe and a grab rail; all fitt d within a single 3 hour visit.

Over last few months we have seen positive feedback from several other teams who have been working with Vanguard including Benefit , Planning, Parking and Recruitment. The new approach now used by the Benefits team has reduced the average time taken to process new claims from 18 days to 6½ days.

The next services to be working with Vanguard are Strategic Housing, Tenancy Services and Environmental Health. We look forward to sharing more success stories in these teams and improving your experience of the Council even more. We are always looking for ways to improve how we deliver our services to you and to improve your experience when contacting us. Since June 2013, we have been working with a team of consultants called **Vanguard** to help us challenge our thinking and methods of working. By doing this we are finding a much more customer focussed approach.

The refurbished pools and modernised, extended changing facilities will make swimming even more fun at Fareham Leisure Centre while the relaxing health suite with steam room, sauna and cold water drench shower, gives a luxury touch. The brand new gym contains £500,000 of state-of-the art equipment designed to inspire both new members and seasoned gym fans.

Executive Leader of Fareham Borough Council, Cllr Seán Woodward, said: "The Fareham Leisure Centre open day was a perfect showcase of these extended facilities and I was delighted with the turnout and support from local people. I would urge everyone to make the most of the Centre and enjoy the wide range of fitness facilities on offer here."

We have appointed Balfour Beatty, the firm that constructed the Aquatic Centre for the 2012 London Olympics, to design and build the new centre which will have:

- A 25 metre long pool with 6 swimming lanes
- A learner pool
- A gym with 100 pieces of equipment
- Exercise room
- Dance studio


